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Class Page 3 of 3 STAND: don't lean or crouch forward on the podium. Don't sit on the table. Also, don't create unnecessary personal distractions, like wearing a hat or sunglasses (unless needed for medical reasons), or constantly having to flip your hair back or pull it behind your ears.

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GUIDELINES FOR STUDENT PRESENTATIONS IN CLASS

Keep PowerPoint design consistent with a theme. When you use a PowerPoint theme, choose one that will not weaken your classroom presentation. Test it ahead of time to make sure that the text will be readable and visual graphics won't get lost in the background. Limit

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the use of animation and transition effects.

Guidelines for student presentations. These presentations should be planned for twenty minutes max if text delivery or twenty-five minutes max if made up

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of two parts: performance of some music and oral delivery of a contextualization of the music—about the composer, about the performer, or other works, etc. That will leave time for questions.

Guidelines for student presentations

Well in advance of your presentation,

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check the room where it will be presented to make sure that it has everything you will need. Meet with the moderator and other presenters at least 10 minutes before the session. Arrange for someone to distribute your handouts. Sit with other presenters near the front. Remember that this is an oral presentation.

Show no more than 1 slide per minute of speaking time. This means approximately 10-12 slides MAXIMUM for the 12 minutes... We recommend a presentation format of 16:9, 4:3 is also acceptable. Make the letters on your

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slides BIG ENOUGH. Suggested minimum font is 14. Put no more than 12 lines of text ...

Oral Presentation Guidelines

- Highlight key points or reinforce what the facilitator is saying
- Should be short and to the point, include only key words and phrases for visual, reinforcement
- In

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order for your presentation to fit on most screens, text and images should be placed within 95% of the PowerPoint slide. This “action safe” area is seen in the next slide.
