You can schedule artificial incubation but timing natural incubation is hit or miss. If you are ordering

There are some other problems primarily mechanical in nature that go along with artificial incubation. If the incubator has only one thermostat, the switch can stick causing the machine to overheat. Any prolonged temperatures greater than 102 degrees F will be fatal to the incubated embryos. The machine may stop heating for some reason.
