Blackburn calls the traditional view "Cartesian dualism," since he sees Descartes as a philosophical defender of the tradition. (But we saw that it was Plato's view as well.) In Chapter Two, Cartesian dualism is introduced as the view that holds that we are made up of two distinct substances - two kinds of stuff: physical stuff and spiritual or mental stuff.
